MAGDRL'S MISSION

The Mid-Atlantic Great Dane Rescue League, Inc. (MAGDRL) was organized in 1979 to serve the seven State Mid-Atlantic regions. We are a D.C. Corp. and have a charitable tax exemption under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

MAGDRL is staffed completely by volunteers. Like all humane groups, MAGDRL is in the unique position of helping *both* humans and pets. In our case, the pets are Great Danes and mixed Dane dogs, and the people are all those who have or want the companionship of this breed or, often, just dogs in general.

MAGDRL helps people to:

- Determine the right breed of dog for their lifestyle
- Find healthy, companionable Danes who fit their circumstances.
- Find loving replacement homes for Danes they can no longer keep.
- Become knowledgeable about the care and training of their Dane.
- Resolve Dane physical/behavioral problems
- Overcome their grief at the loss of their beloved pet
- Stretch their tax dollar by assuming the Dane burden from public shelters.

MAGDRL helps *Danes* by providing for the rescue and care of those who have been abandoned, neglected and/or abused by their previous owners. We spay/neuter and provide medical treatment necessary to return the Dane to good health. We also provide training/socialization to ensure their adaptability to new homes. We work to place rescued Danes with people who will provide secure, loving and healthy homes. To do this, MAGDRL screens the applicant and the home, checks references, and enters into a legally binding agreement with the adopting family. We require that the rescued Dane be kept inside the house: a member of the family.

Great Danes can make great companions. We want our rescues to find the best homes possible and for you to find a dog that can become an important part of your family.

Commonly Asked Questions

We get many of our dogs directly from their owners for various reasons such as:

- They got too big
- Don't have the time
- Moving can't take dog
- Having children

We also get many dogs from shelters where their owners have turned them in or they have been picked up as strays, or confiscated from their owners.

Requirements to adopt.

- Phone Interview
- Application
- House Check
- Fenced Yard – no electronic underground pet containment systems
- House dog – dog must be part of the family and not isolated outside or in a basement.
- Dogs must never be chained or tied outside.
- A contract must be signed between the adopter and rescue upon adoption.

We are a non-profit charitable organization and everyone that works with us is a volunteer. There are no paid employees. We do not have a kennel but instead we use a foster system or pay to kennel dogs when necessary.

We do not get puppies too often. We do get many dogs from 1 year and up. It is possible to train an older dog.

We do not place same sex dogs together even though all our dogs are spayed/neutered before they are placed. This to assure an easier transition into their new home with out same sex aggression.

All of our dogs are completely vetted. They are given all shots, tested for heartworm. We treat any health problems they may have.
